## **Training and Staff Development**

During Fiscal Year 2025, a total staff of 630 individuals graduated from Corrections Academy. This includes 518 Correctional Officers, 7 Parole Officers, 25 Non-uniform Staff, and 80 Support Staff. By implementing a strong recruitment strategy, which includes television and radio advertisements, social media campaigns, and close collaboration with the West Virginia Department of Commerce Marketing and Communications, we are continuing to see further reductions.



## **Facility Updates**

#### Stevens Correctional Center and Jail

Following HB 3456, passed by the West Virginia Legislature this year and signed by Governor Patrick Morrisey, Stevens Correctional Center and Jail was officially transferred to WVDCR and is no longer operating as a county-run correctional facility.

#### **Anthony Correctional Center and Jail**

**Facility Replacement Project** 

In the phase 2 project, there are four new buildings being built.

The construction on the project is projected to be completed by the Spring of 2026. The facility will house adult offenders from the age of 18 to 25. There will be 80 male offenders housed in the existing Building 'B' and there will be 32 female offenders housed in the new Female Housing Building. The new Vocational Education building was built inside the perimeter security fence and will allow for any offender to take welding classes. The Automotive Shop class was moved to Building B. Prior, only certain levels of offenders were able to take the two classes.

#### Electronic Security System Projects at 10 Regional Jail and Correctional Facilities

The existing electronic security system, that controls all of the doors and gates, at the 10 Regional Jails and Correctional Facilities was an outdated analog based system. The existing electronic security system is being replaced with a state of the art new electronic security system. The construction on the project started at the beginning of 2025 and will be completed in 2027. The new electronic security system has been installed in 5 of the 10 Regional Jail and Correctional Facilities.

#### **Huttonsville Correctional Center and Jail**

Fire Suppression Sprinkler System Project

Huttonsville Correctional Center and Jail originally opened in 1939. Prior to 1992, none of the existing buildings that were original or added were protected by the fire suppression sprinkler system. Any additional buildings that were added since 1992 had the fire suppression sprinkler system installed. Construction of the project started at the beginning of 2025 and will be completed in 2026. All required buildings will be protected by the fire suppression sprinkler system at the facility once the project is completed.

## **Programs and Services**

## **Community Service**

During Fiscal Year 2025, a total of 135,367 hours of community service were completed by eligible residents, offenders, and parolees across 11 facilities. These community service activities encompassed various initiatives, including community and highway cleanups, as well as community beautification projects.

#### **Policies and Audits**

The Policy and Audit Section completed their three year goal of conducting policy audits of all WVDCR residential facilities early and began the second round of audits to ensure continued compliance with current agency Policy Directives. Policy revisions and other steps toward American Correctional Center accreditation continue across the agency.

#### **Prison Rape Elimination Act Compliance**

All facilities within the agency, both adult and juvenile achieved PREA (Prison Rape Elimnination Act) compliance in 2025. The PREA Audits that were completed and received accreditation during FY25:

## **Programs and Services continued ...**

#### Recidivism

The West Virginia Division of Corrections and Rehabilitation (WVDCR) is utilizing targeted programs such as RSAT and GOALS to combat the state's ongoing opioid crisis within its correctional facilities. The Residential Substance Abuse Treatment (RSAT) program delivers intensive, evidence-based substance use treatment in residential settings across eight facilities, encompassing over 510 treatment beds (including GOALS). RSAT aims to interrupt the cycle of addiction and incarceration by equipping individuals for successful reintegration and connecting them with community-based care upon release.

The Getting Over Addicted Lifestyles Successfully (GOALS) program, implemented within regional correctional facilities, provides rehabilitative education and treatment to individuals with offenses related to substance use. It functions as both an intervention mechanism and a route to the reinstatement of driving privileges, thereby incentivizing recovery and facilitating reintegration into society.

The WVDCR additionally collaborates with community organizations to offer peer recovery support services, medication-assisted treatment (MAT), and transitional planning, aiming to mitigate overdose risk and recidivism. These synchronized endeavors underscore a comprehensive approach to addressing addiction through therapeutic intervention and rehabilitation, rather than solely through incarceration.

Groups Recover Together, dedicated to evidence-based mental health and substance use support, has visited all Getting Over Addicted Lifestyle Successfully (GOALS) units in the jails and plans to visit all Residential Substance Abuse Treatment (RSAT) programs in the prisons. Their flyer is available on offender tablets, allowing offenders to request assistance and support for reentry. These efforts aim to reduce recidivism by providing ongoing support before and after release.

Financial Literal and Family Dynamic Courses from the Change Company were added to the RSAT and GOALS curriculum, providing offenders with practical life skills that support successful reentry and reduce the likelihood of reoffending. The Junior Totten Award was created this year to honor outstanding Religious Volunteers, inspired by Mr. Totten's 50+years of service. Three recipients were recognized in the inaugural year. Positive mentorship and spiritual guidance are important in supporting offenders and reducing repeat offences.

DCR launched an online training and tracking system for volunteers with the help of the WVDCR Academy to address scheduling challenges. This ensures all volunteers are properly trained, supporting a stable environment that can help lower recidivism rates.

There have been ten Substance Abuse Therapists who completed Training for Trainers through the Change Company, enabling them to train new facilitators and expand access to substance abuse treatment.



## **Community Partnerships**

The conclusion of the Prestera Pilot Program at Western Regional Jail was a success, leading to better engagement and well-being among participants. Prestera's services- including crisis support, health and wellness, outpatient care, and substance use services—were well received by both inmates and staff. The program saw fewer incidents needing intervention and strong support for expanding these services. Based on the pilot's success, Prestera will now provide services at South Central Regional Jail with a dedicated Case Manager. This expansion will follow the proven model from Western Regional Jail, adapted to local needs of the area.

The Offender Services Department of WVDCR partnered with the Martinsburg Initiative to provide parenting programs to Eastern Regional Jail offenders. These programs can assist with custody issues and court-ordered requirements, strengthening family ties and supporting lower recidivism rates.

Northern Regional Jail piloted the Vasco Translator V4 in July 2025, supporting 110 languages both verbally and in writing. Early results are very positive, helping non-English speaking access programs that support reentry and reduce recidivism.



## **Events**

#### **Corrections Day at the Legislature**

On February 25, 2025, the West Virginia Legislature issued a citation and resolution to formally recognize the West Virginia Division of Corrections and Rehabilitation (WVDCR) for its service and contributions to public safety. The event, attended by officials from the West Virginia Department of Homeland Security and WVDCR, underscored the WVDCR's unwavering dedication to improving public safety, ensuring offender accountability, and successfully reintegrating offenders into society.

#### **Mock Prison Riot**

The 28th Annual Mock Prison Riot was held at the historic West Virginia Moundsville Penitentiary from May 4-7, 2025. This event attracted a total of 808 attendees representing 32 states and 8 countries. The agenda featured a skills competition, an awards ceremony, various workshops, training scenarios, and demonstrations of advanced technology. The event concluded with a Charitable Golf Tournament at the Oglebay Golf Course.

### **Second Chance Job Fairs**

As a part of DCR's mission to successfully integrate offenders into society, South Central Regional Jail continued to host Second Chance Job Fairs and Parkersburg Correctional Center hosted its first one and it was a tremendous success. The initiative is designed to connect offenders with local employers and workforce contacts, providing a vital pathway to stable employment upon release. DCR partners with the West Virginia Schools of Diversion and Transition and West Virginia Jobs and Hope to assist with the coordination of these events and utilize resources for the offenders.

Feedback from employers was overwhelmingly positive. The success of these events underscores the importance of second chances and the role of employment in reducing recidivism. DCR is proud to continue these job fairs for offenders as they work toward brighter futures.



## **Employee of the Year**

The 2025 Employee of the Year Ceremony was held at the WVDCR Corrections Training Academy in May 2025. Congratulations to all the award recipients.

**Corporal Edward Roby** from Potomac Highlands Regional Jail was named the agency's Employee of the Year.

Corporal Roby has exemplified the mission and values of the WVDCR through his commitment to public safety, passion for recruiting and strong work ethic.

Corporal Roby began his career as a Correctional Officer with the WV Regional Jail Authority in 2000, serving until 2005. He returned to the Potomac Highlands Regional Jail and Correctional Facility in December 2023, quickly becoming an indispensable member of the Transportation Department, where he was initially one of only two officers responsible for this duty for over a year.

In January 2025, Corporal Roby volunteered to arrive early to supervise and mentor less experienced staff in a new method of administering suboxone, aiming to mitigate hoarding, selling, and trading. His dedication and commitment are evident in the significant hours he has worked over the past two years.

Even after receiving the agency's Employee of the Year award, Corporal Roby successfully earned a spot on the C.E.R.T. unit. His willingness to consistently go above and beyond makes him a role model for other officers, and his Superintendent considers both himself and the agency fortunate to have him.

# **Organizational Chart**







#### Commissioner

**David L. Kelly** serves as Commissioner of the West Virginia Division of Corrections and Rehabilitation, appointed by Governor Patrick Morrisey in June 2025. With a career spanning more than four decades in law enforcement, government, and ministry, Kelly brings deep institutional knowledge, frontline experience, and principled leadership to West Virginia's correctional system.

Kelly began his public service journey in Pleasants County, where he worked as a dispatcher, correctional officer, and sheriff's deputy. He went on to serve two terms as Pleasants County Sheriff, earning community respect for his steady leadership and commitment to justice. He later worked as a criminal investigator in both the private sector and through the Tyler County Prosecuting Attorney's Office, gaining firsthand insight into the complexities of criminal investigations and legal proceedings.

His dedication to public service extended into elected office, where he served as a Tyler County Commissioner before being elected to the West Virginia House of Delegates. During his time in the legislature, Kelly served as Deputy Speaker of the House, was a member of the influential House Judiciary Committee, and chaired both the Committee on Jails and Prisons and the Select Committee on Prevention and Treatment of Substance Abuse. He was a key voice in efforts to address jail overcrowding, enhance correctional officer pay, expand addiction recovery programs, and implement meaningful rehabilitation and reentry services for incarcerated individuals.

In addition to his law enforcement and legislative experience, Kelly has served as the senior pastor of Faith Fellowship Ministries in Wetzel County since 1998. His pastoral work has shaped a leadership style grounded in empathy, accountability, and a commitment to human dignity.

As Commissioner, Kelly is focused on strengthening West Virginia's correctional facilities by addressing critical staffing shortages, improving retention, and expanding training opportunities for correctional officers. Under his leadership, Kelly hopes to build on the vision of the West Virginia Division of Corrections and Rehabilitation by continuing to enhance its officer training program to better prepare new recruits for the demands of the job, promote safety within facilities, and support long-term career development. He remains committed to advancing strategic reforms that prioritize public safety, elevate standards of inmate care, and reduce recidivism. Kelly leads with a vision of justice that is firm, fair, and rooted in faith.

He and his wife, Jan, live in Sistersville. They are proud parents and grandparents, active in both their church and local community.



## **Deputy Commissioner**

**Lance Yardley** was named Deputy Commissioner for the West Virginia Division of Corrections and Rehabilitation in 2024 and served as Interim Commissioner in 2025. He began his career as a Correctional Officer at South Central Regional Jail. Throughout his more than 30-year career, he has served in various roles in multiple facilities across the state, including Central Regional Jail, Huttonsville Correctional Center and Pruntytown Correctional Center. Most recently, he served as the Chief of Institutional Operations for WVDCR.

Yardley, a West Virginia native, attended Potomac State College and Glenville State College.

The Director of Operations oversees the contract management of all inmate services contracts; manages the internal audits section; and serves as the liaison for the Division of Corrections and Rehabilitation and the Department of Administrative Services.

#### Construction, Engineering, & Maintenance

The West Virginia Division of Corrections Director of Construction and Engineering is responsible for overseeing Corrections physical improvements in the facilities throughout the state.

#### **Correctional Healthcare**

Physician Director Dr. Gary Davenport

This department serves as the WVDCR's liaison with health care vendors. Medical Services participates in assessments, planning, implementation and evaluation of policy and practice throughout the system.



## **General Counsel**

Sean Francisco was hired as General Counsel for the West Virginia Division of Corrections and Rehabilitation in April of 2024. Francisco is a West Virginia native who earned his undergraduate degree from West Virginia University. Sean then went to law school and graduated from the University of Baltimore School of Law. He clerked for a short time for Judge Lawrence Robert Daniels of the Baltimore County Circuit Court. He also worked in the law office of Timothy A. Dachille and Associates. Francisco then returned home to West Virginia where he went to work as an assistant prosecuting attorney in the Wood County Prosecuting Attorney's Office. He was an assistant prosecuting attorney for over 16 years. During this same timeframe he acted as Assistant City Attorney for the City of Parkersburg for three years. Sean left the Wood County Prosecuting Attorney's Office to act as General Counsel and Human Resources Director for the Wood County Board of Education. After three years of service Sean left the Board of Education and joined the law firm of Jan Dils Attorneys at Law for a brief time. Prior to joining WVDCR, Sean operated his own legal practice; traveling the State of West Virginia, litigating a variety of cases. Sean has served on the West Virginia State Bar Board of Governors, the West Virginia Office of Disciplinary Counsel Lawyer Disciplinary Board Hearing Panel, President of the Wood County Bar Association, as well as previously serving and continuing to serve on numerous boards of community foundations and groups. Sean is happy to be a part of the WVDCR family.

## Professional Standards and Compliance Assistant Commissioner

**James Stout** began his professional career in January 1994 with the West Virginia State Police, where he held numerous roles. He advanced to upper-level management positions, ultimately achieving the rank of Captain. He retired from the West Virginia State Police in February 2019, following 25 years of honorable service. In October 2019, Mr. Stout accepted the position of Chief Correctional Officer at North Central Regional Jail, serving for approximately three and a half years. Subsequently, he was appointed Superintendent of the Donald R. Kuhn Juvenile Center in Julian, West Virginia. He also served the Department of Homeland Security (WV DHS) as Inspector

General before returning to the Division of Corrections and Rehabilitation in 2023, where he currently serves as Assistant Commissioner of Professional Standards and Compliance.

#### **Inmate Population 2001-2024**


The table on the right and the chart below shows the total average sentenced inmate population in WVDCR institutions and the total average sentenced inmate population that have been committed to the WVDCR, but were awaiting prison space in county/regional jails during the past 24 years. During that period, the total inmate population for WVDCR has increased by a total of 1731 inmates.

Inmates that were committed to the WVDCR but were waiting in county/regional jails for bed space in WVDCR facilities have decreased to a record low of 621 in 2024 from a high of 1782 in 2012.

The WVDCR also houses inmates in the McDowell County Correctional Center on a per diem contract basis; this population is represented in the "Contracted" column. This segment has increased by 164 inmates in the last 24 years




### **Number of Clients Supervised**

The map to the right shows the number of clients supervised by Parole Services, by county at the end of FY 2025. Wood County had the highest case load, followed by Cabell, Kanawha, Raleigh and Berkeley Counties. Some reasons for these high numbers are the fact that Kanawha and Cabell Counties have high populations compared to the rest of the state, while Berkeley borders other states and supervises a large number of interstate compact cases.



#### INTERGOVERNMENTAL AFFAIRS

### **Assistant Commissioner**

David Farmer began his career with the WV Regional Jail Authority in February 2002 as the Director of Inmate services at the South Central Regional Jail in Charleston, WV. He later became the Administrator of the Southwestern Regional Jail in Logan, WV in December of 2011 where he remained until being named Director of the Academy/ Deputy Chief of Operations in August 2014. In June of 2015, Farmer was selected as the Executive Director of the Regional Jail and Correctional Facility Authority until the consolidation of the state's correctional agencies in July of 2018. Farmer was then appointed as an Assistant Commissioner of the Intergovernmental Affairs Bureau where he now oversees Constituent Services, Victims Services, Inmate Grievance appeals, Correctional Industries and the WV Division of Corrections and Rehabilitation Corrections Academy.

#### **Victims Services**

The Victims Services Program offers direct services to victims of crime in all 55 counties in West Virginia for DCR. Carla Shirey is the Victim Services Specialist and provides services to victims by registering them in the OIS database and assisting them with the West Virginia Victims Notification Everyday (VINE) notification program. Registration is by phone, email, TTY, SMR text, and by using the VINE app. New VINE registration totals for FY 2025 were 6,696 and VINE Notifications were 24,730. In FY 2025, the Victim Services Coordinator supported over 390 crime victims, assisted with 220 parole hearings, and aided 175 survivors or family members of homicide.


#### **Correctional Industries**
